Michael Diamond's 1996 Olympic medal sells for 50k in 2019.

The two-time Olympic shooting champion Michael Diamond has auctioned off his remaining gold medal for \$50,000 to help support his family as he battles serious health issues.

The 47 year old Michael made the difficult decision to sell his Atlanta 1996 Olympic medal, which he won for trap shooting, after being confronted by news he needed a heart transplant and gall bladder surgery. Diamond had already auctioned his second gold medal, won for the same event at the Sydney 2000 Olympics Games, for \$72,000 in 2017. He followed the auction of



his remaining medal, which was expected to fetch up to \$70,000, from hospital, where he was recovering from gall bladder surgery he underwent earlier. It went for \$50,000, which will be used to support his three daughters with

ex-wife Cathy. Diamond's dreams of competing at a seventh Olympics and possibly picking up another medal in Tokyo next year were dashed when he was rushed to a Newcastle hospital with heart failure late in 2019. With a heart functioning at only 15 per cent, Diamond's goal now is to be around to worry about his kids. "It's a pretty sobering feeling to have your heart fail on you," Diamond said in November. "I do want to hang around, I want to see my kids get older and get married and I want to have grandchildren."

Because they had no reservations at a busy restaurant, my elderly neighbor and his wife were told there would be a 45 minute wait for a table. "Young man, we're both 90 years old," the husband said. "We may not have 45 minutes." They were seated immediately.

Unusual or downright scary.

How would you like to take to the firing line with a firearm which needed only one trigger pull to give you five timed shots with sufficient pause between to adjust your aim? WOW.

An old German manuscript with the date 1445 A.D. describes a similar sort of weapon.

"Several projectiles can be fired from one GUN after it has been ignited only once; the Projectiles are made of Iron or Lead and each goes off in its own turn."

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Loading would present some problems and delays. The manuscript goes on to describe this process

"Pour as much powder into the gun, as corresponds to the length of the Projectile, press the projectile on to the powder, then as much Powder again and once again a Projectile until the gun is full." Careful shooters could

stop at five. Casual types could use larger barrels and shoot a complete match without pause. For the technically minded here's how it worked.

"A hole passes through each Projectile, so that Fire can communicate from one to another. The holes are as big as the point of a Distaff (a stick or spindle ED) and are filled with powder and contain a Sulphur match,



when one lights this, each shot goes off one after another."

The projectiles were cylindrical or drum shaped with a hole drilled through their centres, this prevented them being turned during loading. Round projectiles were found to turn and the hole could line up with the barrel wall and spoil the Roman Candle effect.

The old illustration from the manuscript makes them look like a cross between king size wad cutters and Lifesavers.

Known as "FEVERWERKEBUCH" these ancient "autos" are described in the early chapters of Superimposed Load Firearms 1360 — 1860 by Captain D.R. Baxter.

A superposed load or stacked charge or superimposed load is a method used by various muzzleloading firearms, from matchlocks to caplocks, as well as newer Metal Storm weapons, to fire multiple shots from a single barrel without reloading. In a sense, superposed load guns were the first automatic firearms, as they fired multiple shots per pull of the trigger.

As you know at the last AGM, the membership approved the introduction of a Maintenance Levy to enable us to carry out maintenance of our new range. There are many jobs that need to be undertaken, and if they cannot be done by way of a working bee, then a contractor needs to complete the work, and of course be paid. The Maintenance Levy is \$100 / financial year, payable on renewal of your membership. Those of you who have multiple year memberships, will receive an invoice for \$100.00. If you choose not to pay the amount, then the amount will be deducted from your remaining years of membership.

Those over 70 years of age and under 18 are exempt from the levy. There is of course of way of avoiding payment of the Maintenance Levy, and that is by taking part in a Working Bee (4 to be exact, as each one is worth \$25 towards the Levy). Those of you who have already attended working bees will receive credits for those working bees.

The dates for the working bees are as follows:-

Saturday, 15th February10.30 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. done Sunday, 16th February 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. done 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Saturday, 14th March Sunday, 15th March 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Saturday, 18th April 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Sunday, 19th April 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Saturday, 16th May 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Sunday, 17th May Saturday, 13th June 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. Sunday, 14th June 10.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m.

The dates for the second half of the year will be issued in June, once we establish what is the preferred day and time for the working bees. If you wish, you may also pay the Levy in advance during our scheduled working bees or scheduled club shoots.

Some of the jobs required to be completed:Build lean-to at poly tank to collect rain water, Clean drains as required, Clip overgrowth on range grass – use a spotter,



Collect dead weeds and place in compost pile, Cut thistles too big to spray, Empty cabinet @ SIPC – ute or trailer required, Inventory dead plantings, Mowing, external areas of range, walking strip inside range, Plant tube stock, Re-stack corrugated tin, Remove dirt from rubble drain behind 50m and 25m targets, Repair BBQ table, Seal valve to poly tank, Signs to be wire tied to fencing and/or attached to walls, Spray weeds – farmers' friends; wild tobacco, solanum, thistles Spray weeds in access way between main building & car park wall, Spray weeds in car park areas – or by hand Cont.

Spread sand to level poly tank, Waterproofing of flag pole on mound, Weed cages and check if plants still alive, Weed garden beds, Weed swamp area – by hand, Whipper snipping of all perimeter mounds. Please ensure you wear appropriate clothing, long trousers (snakes!), enclosed shoes, a hat for sun protection and sturdy gloves depending on what you are going to be volunteering to do. Looking forward to seeing as many of you as possible. (Many hands make light work. ED)
